THURSDAY READING CIRCLE

FEBRUARY: *I Thought You Said This Would Work* by Ann Garrin A road trip can drive anyone over the edge — especially two former best friends — in bestselling author Ann Garvin's funny and poignant novel about broken bonds, messy histories, and the power of forgiveness.

Widowed Samantha Arias hasn't spoken to Holly Dunfer in forever. It's for the best. Samantha prefers to avoid conflict. The blisteringly honest Holly craves it. What they still have in common puts them both back on speed dial: a mutual love for Katie, their best friend of twenty-five years, now hospitalized with cancer and needing one little errand from her old college roomies.

Samantha and Holly are following every new turn – toward second chances, unexpected romance, and self-discovery – and finally blowing the dust off the secret that broke their friendship. On the open road, they'll try to put it back together – for themselves and for the love of Katie.

MARCH: Nomadland by Jessica Bruder

From the beet fields of North Dakota to the National Forest campgrounds of California to Amazon's Camper Force Program in Texas, employers have discovered a new low-cost labor pool, made up largely of transient older Americans. Finding that social security comes up short, often underwater on mortgages, these invisible casualties of the Great Recession have taken to the road by the tens of thousands in late-model RVs, travel trailers, and vans, forming a growing community of nomads.

On frequently traveled routes between seasonal jobs, Jessica Bruder meets people from all walks of life: a former professor, a McDonald's president, a minister, a college administrator, and a motorcycle cop, among many others – including her irrepressible protagonist, a onetime cocktail waitress, Home Depot clerk and general contractor named Linda May.

APRIL: Joshua by Joseph Girzone

When Joshua moves to a small cabin on the edge of town, the local people are mystified by his presence. A quiet and simple man, Joshua appears to seek nothing for himself. He supports

himself by working as a carpenter. He charges very little for his services, yet his craftsmanship is exquisite. The statue of Moses that he carves for the local synagogue prompts amazement as well as consternation.

What are the townsfolk to make of the enigmatic stranger? Some people report having seen him carry a huge cherry log on his shoulders effortlessly. Still others talk about the child in a poor part of town who was dreadfully ill but, after Joshua's visit, recovered completely.

Despite his benevolence and selfless work in the community, some remain suspicious. Finally, in an effort to address the community's doubts, Joshua is confronted by the local church leaders.

MAY: Once Upon a Town by Bob Greene

In search of "the best America there ever was," bestselling author and award-winning journalist Bob Greene finds it in a small Nebraska town few people pass through today — a town where Greene discovers the echoes of the most touching love story imaginable: a love story between a country and its sons. During World War II, American soldiers from every city and walk of life rolled through North Platte, Nebraska, on troop trains en route to their ultimate destinations in Europe and the Pacific. The tiny town, wanting to offer the servicemen warmth and support transformed its modest railroad depot int the the North Platte Canteen.

Every day of the year, every day of the war, the Canteen – staffed and funded entirely by local volunteers – was open from five am until the last troop train of the day pulled away after midnight. Astonishingly, the remote plains community of only 12,000 people provided welcoming words, friendship, and baskets of food and treats to more than six million GIs by the time the war ended.

In this poignant and heartwarming eyewitness history, based on interviews with North Platte residents and the soldiers who once passed through Bob Greene tells a classic, lost-in-themists-of-time American story of a grateful country honoring its brave and dedicated sons.



Update From Trustees:

In the January meeting of the trustees, the following officers were elected:

- Vice-chair Scott Yeazel

The recent cold spell led to the breakage of a fire suppression pipe in the attic above the hallway between the prayer room and library, triggering the release of water into our hallway ceiling; thus resulting in calls to Cornbelt Fire, Matco Fire Protection, Inc., and ServPro to mitigate the water damage. Repairs are still needed that include: replacement of some insulation; drywall repair; and replacement of some ceiling tiles. The new nitrogen generator system installed last fall continues to go through a shakedown period as it gradually replaces oxygen inside of our dry system pipes in the attic. Recent repairs in other areas of the church include replacement of a limited number of shingles from wind damage; repair of kitchen range exhaust fan; repair of several furnaces; and replacement of kitchen freezer compressor.

Finance Committee Report

Dear Friends.

Pledged giving for the month of December was approximately \$28,000 and non-pledged giving was approximately \$7,000 making total unrestricted giving about \$35,000. Total operating expenses were approximately \$37,000 generating a net operating loss for the month of \$2,000. For the 2021 year, pledged giving was \$298,000 and non-pledged giving about \$72,000 making total unrestricted income about \$370,000 versus expenses of about \$392,000 for the year. MUMC realized \$47,000 in PPP loan forgiveness in January of 2021 so the net operating income for the year was about \$25,000. Expenses for the year were higher than expected due to expenses related to the church building fire suppression system (\$30,000) and heating/cooling equipment (\$10,000). Overall church building maintenance expenses totaled \$55,615.39 versus a budget of \$20,000 for 2021. All other major expense categories came in under budget. The Christmas Offering was \$2,830 and will be disbursed to local and conference charities. There was also a \$38,000 gift to the memorial fund for scholarships. Overall, 2021 was a positive financial year for the church despite a very difficult environment.

An additional pledge was received in December so the final pledge total for 2022 is \$286,616. Thank you for supporting our church ministries!

Prayer Shawl Ministry


